



November-December Reminder

I was recently reminded of the "The Rabbi's Gift" from the Prologue of *The Different Drum: Community Making and Peace* by M. Scott Peck, M.D.

A monastery had fallen upon hard times [because of persecution. Only five monks were left in the decaying house:] the abbot and four others, all over seventy in age. Clearly, it was a dying Order.

In the deep woods surrounding the monastery there was a little hut that a rabbi from a nearby town occasionally used for a hermitage. Through their many years of prayer and contemplation, the old monks had become a bit *psychic*, so they could always *sense* when the rabbi was in his hermitage. "The rabbi is in the woods, the rabbi is in the woods again," they would whisper to each other.

As he agonized over the imminent death of his Order, it occurred to the abbot at one such time to visit the hermitage and ask the rabbi if by some possible chance he could offer any advice that might save the monastery.

The rabbi welcomed the abbot at his hut. But when the abbot explained the purpose of his visit, the rabbi could only commiserate with him. "I know how it is!" he exclaimed. "The spirit has gone out of the people. It is the same in *my* town. Almost no one comes to the synagogue anymore." So the old abbot and the old rabbi wept together. Then they read parts of the Torah and quietly spoke of *deep* things.... [Finally, it was time to leave.] The abbot asked, "Is there nothing you can tell me, no piece of advice you can give me that would help me save my dying Order?" "No, I am sorry," the rabbi responded. "I have no advice to give. The only thing I can tell you is that the Messiah is one of you." When the abbot returned...his fellow monks...asked, "Well, what did the rabbi say?"

"He couldn't help," the abbot said. "We just wept and read the Torah together. The only thing he did say, just as I was leaving...was that the Messiah is one of us. I don't know what he meant."

[In the days and weeks that followed, they each pondered what the rabbi's words meant.] They thought, "The Messiah is one of us!

Do you suppose he meant the abbot? Yes, if he meant anyone, he probably meant *Father Abbot*. He has been our leader for more than a generation. On the other hand, he might have meant Brother Thomas [for certainly] he is a *holy* man....Certainly he could not have meant Brother Elred! Elred gets crotchety at times. But come to think of it, even though he is a thorn in our sides, when you look back on it, Elred is virtually always *right*....But surely not Brother Phillip. Phillip is so *passive*, a real *nobody*. But then, almost mysteriously, he has a *gift* for somehow always *being there* when you *need* him. He just magically appears by your side....He couldn't possibly have meant *me*. I'm just an ordinary person."

As they contemplated in this manner, the old monks began to treat each other with *extraordinary respect* on the off chance that one among them might be the Messiah....

Because the forest in which the Order was situated was beautiful, [people began to wander onto the lovely lawns and gardens. More and more people came week after week because they sensed this was a holy place. They appreciated the way the monks appeared to radiate love.]

Then it happened that some of the younger men who came....asked if they could join the monastery....So within a few years the monastery had once again become a thriving order and, thanks to the rabbi's gift, a vibrant center of light and spirituality...

I was also reminded of Jesus' parable of the sheep and the goats in [Matthew 25:31-46](#) that also speaks of the Messiah being one of us. *The Message* translates verses 37-40 this way:

"Then those 'sheep' are going to say, 'Master, what are you talking about? When did we ever see you hungry and feed you, thirsty and give you a drink? And when did we ever see you sick or in prison and come to you?' Then the King will say, 'I'm telling the solemn truth: Whenever you did one of these things to someone overlooked or ignored, that was me—you did it to me.'

Both of these parables or stories invite us to treat each other and everyone we meet (including ourselves) with extraordinary respect because Jesus the Messiah is among us and in us. When we see Jesus in everyone and treat them as we would treat Jesus then not only will Riverside flourish and thrive as a vibrant center of light and spirituality but we will have joined God in bringing the Kingdom of God more fully alive here in Muncie and around the world.

Trustees' Corner

Above and Beyond-Preparing for the Future update:

The Above and Beyond list of projects is becoming shorter and shorter as we check each item off. Heat Pump number five has been installed in the Joseph W. Rankin Library. Plans are to install another unit in the Narthex before next summer. The Trustees would like to thank everyone that contributed to the Above and Beyond Projects and to those that continue to fulfill your pledges. Initial donations and pledges totaled \$19,865. As of the 16th of October \$24,623 had been given. To God be the glory.

Weather Related Church Closing Information:

The Trustees wish to advise you that if the city declares a snow or other emergency and requests that travel be restricted to essential or emergency travel only, Sunday services will be cancelled. This would also pertain to any meetings scheduled during the week. We, however, encourage you to use good judgment when the streets and roads are hazardous to travel on when a State of Emergency has not been declared.

If a meeting is cancelled, please contact Tom Schamp (765) 749-4410. He will contact WLBC 104.1, WTHR Ch 13 and Fox59 Ch 11. An e-mail will be sent to those who have given their e-mail address to the church. If possible, an announcement will also be placed on the church's answering machine. If in doubt, please call the church 288-4257 or Pastor Young at 288-3826 or his cell at 278-8733. Committee Chairs may also consider establishing a telephone chain call procedure for their committee.

If a snow or other emergency prohibiting travel is not declared we will have church for those who can make it safely to Riverside. If you do not feel safe traveling to church, please stay home. If you have a responsibility at church for the Sunday in question, please stay home, but notify the church of your decision to do so. That will keep us from worrying about you being stuck in the snow and allow us to recruit a replacement among those who are able to travel.

You don't have to be in church to worship God. Jesus in John 4 tells the Samaritan woman that location doesn't matter. We are to "worship the Father in spirit and truth" (John 4:23). However, Luke tells us that "on the Sabbath day [Jesus] went into the synagogue, as was his custom" (Luke 4:16). And Hebrews 10:25 admonishes us "Let us not give up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but let us encourage one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching."

The weather forecasters said the “snow” word this morning. Brrrrr.... Guess it’s time to get the blankets out of the linen closet. The people who need temporary housing in this cold weather cannot go to a linen closet and pull out the winter blankets. During November, the Missions Committee is again helping the Muncie YWCA stock up for winter. The YWCA provides a warm room for them but never seems to have enough bedding to be sure that all residents have the fresh blankets, sheets, pillows and pillow cases they need.

With the cold weather comes flu season. This year the YWCA is also appealing for help stocking their residents’ medicine chests. Tylenol, Motrin, cold medicine and hygiene items are in high demand. Also there never seems to be enough laundry detergent and dryer sheets so the residents can keep their clothes and bedding clean.

The YWCA’s greatest bedding need is for pillows and pillow cases so no one has to sleep on a second-hand pillow. Sheets and blankets for single beds and towels and wash cloths are also appreciated.

So when you are shopping for your cold weather needs, please buy extra. You can bring pillows, pillowcases, sheets, blankets, towels, washcloths, hygiene items, Tylenol and detergent to Riverside UM Church and put them in the YWCA box in the lobby between November 6 and November 27. We’ll take care of transporting them to the YWCA before the snow gets too deep.

Neighborhood Blitz

The Radical Hospitality Team assembled and canvassed the Riverside neighborhood in early September. Nearly 600 invite bags were hung on doorknobs from Centennial to Riverside and Wheeling to the campus. The effort produced enough fruit to start an informal class that had been meeting following Sunday morning service. 
Start planning now for the

Longest Night Service



December 21 every year is the day with the least amount of daylight. Indeed many of the nights of this Christmas season may feel especially long since your loved one is no longer with you to share in this season.


